PA Message from our Pastor, Rev. Chris Houtz

Friends of Oak Tree-Iselin Church,

A couple weeks ago, on November 19th, I spoke about taking risks. In the sermon, the risks were focused on our Christian call in the world. However, those aren't the only ones we can take in, and for, our faith. For instance, if you are a nervous public speaker, you can take a risk and be a liturgist. It may not seem like much for some people, but for others, the idea of public speaking is terrifying. Even if it is in front of people you know well. I remember the first time I preached in church. It was the Sunday after Christmas. For seminary interns—that is one of the most common Sundays to preach—along with the Sunday after Easter morning! The crowds that had been growing during the holidays reach their pinnacle on Christmas Eve, and then quickly decline. It seemed more noticeable than normal that year because it was New Year's Eve! So, very few people were there. At least, that's how it felt until the moment I stepped into the pulpit! I absolutely understand that fear, and I know it can be a great risk to read in church! But I invite you all to take risks in faith. Like being a liturgist, it can be something in church. You can serve as an elder or deacon. You can join the choir. You can even start a new ministry if you want!

Now, I say all this because I am also going to take a risk this Advent! You see, it is currently November 14th as I write this, and I am attempting to plan our Advent services—and sermons—now. It may not seem risky, but I want to do a sermon series that I have been thinking about since last Christmas! And we will see how it works! But remember—as I said on November 19th, the worst thing that can happen is something doesn't work! Taking the risk is what counts in faith. With that in mind, I want to introduce our Advent sermon series.

My favorite Christmas movie is "A Christmas Carol." I'm sure you all have your personal favorite versions—for me it has been the musical with Albert Finney as that old miser—Ebenezer Scrooge! But this sermon series is not about that version; rather, it's about the story itself. I am going to use that famous Christmas story as a guide for each Sunday in Advent. In the past, we have had children's pageants and a Service of Lessons & Carols on Sundays during Advent. But if you look at our calendar, we will be having four regular services during Advent this year. You may be saying to yourselves right now, "There are—famously—only three ghosts of Christmas: Past, Present, and Yet to Come." Very true! But we have four Sundays for sermons. So, the plan is (as of now—November 14th), is to follow this beloved story along with the lectionary to ask ourselves how we keep Christmas—in our hearts, in our church, and in our world. The first Sunday, Dec. 3, will be the opening warning, as Marley comes to warn Scrooge. Then, the following weeks, we will be visited by the ghosts of Christmas Past, Present, and Yet to Come.

Until then, I want to leave you with one of my favorite quotes form the book. At the end of the story, Scrooge, now a changed man, says:

"I will honor Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all year. I will live in the Past, the Present, and the Future. The Spirits of all Three shall strive within me. I will not shut out the lessons that they teach!"






