TA Message from our Pastor, Rev. Chris Houtz

Friends of Oak Tree-Iselin Church,

I want to take some time and reflect on our Lenten Bible study for this year. Some of you have been coming, but for those who are not able to make it out on a Wednesday night, I want to share a bit about why this study is so important.

Crucifixion was, truly, a terrible way to be executed. Speaking would have been nearly impossible to do. Jesus would have had to lift himself up by his hands in order to expand his diaphragm just to breath, let alone speak. So, the fact that the gospels give us the seven last words of Jesus on the cross, means that Jesus found these to be very important. He was willing to feel the agonizing pain of trying to speak to say the following things:

- "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."
 In the midst of being taunted, beaten, spat at, and mocked, Jesus prays to God to forgive everyone there. But it reaches beyond his own time and is also forgiving each of us of our sins today. This is important because he could have prayed silently, but because he said this prayer out loud, he must have wanted us to hear the prayer. This is a wondrous example of what it means to follow Christ. Jesus shows us the importance of forgiving others.
- 2. "Today, you will be with me in Paradise."
 This passage in Luke is one of my own personal favorites.
 Luke portrays Jesus being crucified along with two criminals.
 One of the criminals joins the crowd in mocking Jesus, but the other one seeks forgiveness and grace. He asks Jesus, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."
 And in response, Jesus tells him they will be in Paradise together. Even at our lowest point, Christ is there for us to call us into Paradise and join him in eternity.
- 3. "Behold your son...behold your mother."
 Only in John's Gospel do any of the disciples remain at Jesus' side. And in John, it is only John. However, all the gospels have a collection of the women in Jesus' life at his side. This is an especially powerful word about Mary, Jesus' mother, who stood by her son's side has he was brutally killed.

We will gather on Thursday night at 7:00 pm for the Maundy Thursday Service with communion




and again, on **Good Friday, March 29**th at 3:00 pm to witness Christ's death on the cross.

What to do with all those hard boiled Easter Eggs...



Memaws Country Eggs Goldenrod

2 cups milk
1/8 cup cornstarch
1 1/2 tablespoons butter
1/2 teaspoon salt
pinch ground black pepper
6 hard-boiled eggs, peeled and sliced
6 slices bread, toasted

Stir milk, cornstarch, butter, salt, and black pepper together in a saucepan over medium heat:

Cook and stir until the mixture is thick and smooth, about 20 minutes.

Stir egg slices into the sauce and cook until just warmed, about 5 minutes. Ladle egg and sauce over toast slices.

Serves 6

Variation:

2 Tablespoons butter2 Tablespoons flour1 Cup milkSalt and pepper to taste4 slices toast

In a saucepot, melt butter. Stir in flour, then add milk slowly, stirring constantly.

Season to taste.

Chop whites of 4 hard-cooked eggs and add to sauce, heat a few minutes.

Ladle over toast and grate the yolks over each serving.

Makes 4 servings.

Leprechauns



Saint Patrick's Day is one of the most celebrated cultural and religious holidays in Europe and America. The holiday, also known as a feast day, is observed on or around March 17. The Irish holiday is marked by parades, foods, music, dance, and other activities. Another thing you are likely to see is a tiny bearded man wearing green suits and hats and partaking in mischief. These mythical creatures are popularly known as leprechauns. Saint Patrick's Day is never complete without the leprechauns since they are known to be great musicians who can also play a variety of instruments including the Irish harp, fiddle, and tin whistle.

Originally, leprechauns had different appearances since they were found in different parts of Ireland. It was believed that they wore red and not green as they do today. Solitary leprechauns wore red jackets while the trooping ones wore green. The jackets had seven buttons, each in a row. They also wore hats which they would use to ball on a wall, usually when they were up to something mischievous. The modern leprechauns are more or less the same in appearance in all parts of Ireland. They are small or tiny enough to sit on one's shoulders. However, some people claim that leprechauns are almost the size of small children. They are depicted as having a green suit, green hat, red beards, buckled shoes, and sitting on a toadstool. The name leprechaun was derived from the Irish word "leipreachan" meaning "pigmy." The creatures first appeared in an ancient tale known as "Adventure of Fergus son of Léti" as Fergus mac Leti, King of Ulster. According to the text, the King fell asleep on the beach and woke up only to find three smallbodied men (luchorpain) dragging him to the sea. The King of Ulster managed to capture his abductors who granted him three wishes for their release. David Russell McAnally indicates that leprechaun is a "degenerated fairy" who is a son of an "evil spirit" and is partly good and partly evil. Like most Irish fairy tales, leprechauns may have its origin from the Tuatha De Danann, a supernatural race of the deities in Irish mythology but rarely appeared in Irish mythology.

Leprechaun is a solitary creature whose main occupation is to make and mend shoes. Although they are practical jokers and mischievous, these mythical creatures are harmless and very intelligent. Irish legend holds that leprechauns are wealthy and derives their wealth from treasure-crocks buried during the time of war. They store their wealth and coins earned from shoemaking in a hidden pot at the end of the rainbow. The legend of the pot of treasure is popular among many people who will often chase rainbow in search of leprechauns and their pot of treasure. It is widely believed that if a leprechaun is caught, it will grant the capturer three wishes in exchange for its freedom. According to some sources like Yourlrish.com, leprechauns are only found in Ireland, specifically rural areas, away from people.

As he was dying, he was clearly concerned about his mother, and made sure the "disciple whom he loved" would take care of her once he was gone.

4. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

These powerful words are the opening verse of Psalm 22. A result of the control of the contro

These powerful words are the opening verse of Psalm 22. A psalm of lament, Psalm 22 shows us, and Jesus demonstrates perfectly, that even our darkest moments, we can still cry out to God. Importantly, we must also remember that Jesus is not just saying these words, but invoking the entire Psalm, that ends with these powerful words:

"To him, indeed, shall all who sleep in the earth bow down; before him shall bow all who go down to the dust, and I shall live for him. Posterity will serve him;

future generations will be told about the Lord and proclaim his deliverance to a people yet unborn, saying that he has done it. "

5. "I thirst."

This may be his most human moment on the cross, albeit said in a very "John-like" way! Frequently, people who are nearing their death become very thirsty. Those of you who have been at the bedside of someone who is conscious as they approach that moment will know a nurse or aid brought a cup of ice chips into the room for them, maybe a cup of water with a straw. This statement is a powerful reminder that yes, Jesus was fully divine, he was the Son of God; but he was also the Son of Humanity—he was fully human.

6. "It is finished."

Jesus constantly told his disciples this was going to happen. They may not have believed him, or understood him, but he did tell them. And at this moment, the purpose of his trip to Jerusalem was finished. This moment also goes into the doctrine of atonement—the idea that Jesus died for us. The moment on the cross is not a discussion of theological doctrine, but it does serve as a reminder that despite our sin, we are forgiven because of Jesus' crucifixion on the cross.

7. "Into your hands I commit my spirit."

His final words on the cross, Jesus offers one last prayer to God. It is a prayer of absolute trust in the Lord. These words come from another psalm—Psalm 31:5. This is how that psalm begins (Psalm 31:1-5):

"In you, O Lord, I seek refuge; do not let me ever be put to shame; in your righteousness deliver me. Incline your ear to me; rescue me speedily. Be a rock of refuge for me, a strong fortress to save me. You are indeed my rock and my fortress; for your name's sake lead me and guide me, take me out of the net that is hidden for me, for you are my refuge. Into your hands I commit my spirit."

In his final moments, he is demonstrating his absolute faith in God.

Friends, throughout this Lenten season, I hope you will take some time and spend it with Christ on the cross. We can learn many lessons about faith, love, forgiveness, and grace. Read each gospels account of the crucifixion, and see what you Christ is saying to, and for, you.
